

### POT POURRI OF FACTS AMERICAN LEGION POST 207 STRATFORD S.D. 57474

Post 207 was granted a Charter on 2-5-1921 to 15 Veterans of WW1

One family has had continuous membership in Post 207 since 2-5-1921; William Jark-Kenneth Jark.

93 Veterans of WW1 were members of Post 207 from 1921 to 1946.

7 families had three sons serving in WW2 at the same time.

59 persons from the Stratford area served during WW2 (12-7-41 lto 12-31-46)

Sgt. Lynn Erdmann was awarded the Silver Star for rescuing a buddy from a mine field.

Brig. Gen. Laverne G. Saunders was awarded the Navy Cross for his activity in the SW Pacific. This award not normally awarded to Army personnel.

Ervin G. Wood was a prisoner of war in Germany in WW2.

Three area residents were killed in action (KIA) during WW2. All were pilots. Albert SVARSTAD Navy Pilot; Harvey SWENSON B-29 bomber pilot; Ervin WESTBY B-24 bomber pilot. William Edgar Stange was found dead at the Brooklyn Navy Pier, cause of death unknown.

26 persons from the Stratford area, served in the Armed Forces during the Korean Conflict1 6-25-50 to 1-31-55.

During the Vietnam era, (2-26-61 to 5-7-75), 32 area persons served in the armed forces of the USA.

From 1978 to 2005, 37 area persons served in the following conflicts.

Lebanon, Granada, Panama, Beruit 8-24-81 to 1-31-91 Desert Storm 8-2-1990 to Present Afghanistan 4-1-2000 to present Iraq Freedom 4-2000 to present National Guard service exclusive of above dates

### INTRODUCTION

The farming community of Stratford, located in SE Brown County, South Dakota, has supplied men and women for all the major conflicts since W W I. Post 207, Stratford, has maintained an active Post since first granted a charter, with an increase of members in recent years.

The American Legion Department of South Dakota, granted Post 207 a Charter in the year 1921. A document attached to the original Charter identified those first members as; Harry Ward Ashford, Paul Henry Brown, Robert J. Carr, Joseph Alexander Coleman, Dennis F. Daly, Harry E. Falk, Rollie S. Hartwell, Rolfe Harris Hesketh, Sterling Francis Missell, Bruno Rock, Gerhard Charles Stange, Henry A. Taylor, Lawrence Walking, and Robert Wiedenbach.

There are no known decendants of the original Charter members currently residing in the Stratford community, or members of Post 207.

Post 207, through it's activities, continues to promote patriotism and respect of flag by parading the Colors at 4th of July celebrations, Memorial Day functions and Military funerals. We will continue to support worthy community programs and those items in the Preamble of the Constitution of the American Legion Department of South Dakota.

One family has maintained continuous membership in Post 207 since 1921. Though not listed on the original charter, William Jark and his son Ken Jark have been active in this Post. William Jark appears in the Post photograph of 1921, and the Post roster furnished by the State Department.

### POST 207 ACTIVITIES 2000

Post 207 fund raiser/stag party was held in early Spring. We were able to net approximately \$1,400. Ticket sales were good, as were choices sold on valuable donated items from Aberdeen and other businesses.

Some donations made within the community during this year were:

- 1. \$25.00 to Children & Youth Month, community taffy pull
- \$105 each for two area highschool students to attend Boys State.
   Reed Johnson, son of Bill Johnson and Sheldon Schwan, son of Steve Schwan of Stratford. Schwan attends Warner High School, Johnson attends Groton.
- \$50.00 was donated to the Tracy Luedeke Fund. She was seriously injured in a farm accident and is the daughter of Dale & Lola Luedeke.
- 4. \$100.00 was given to the costs of building a concession stand at the ball park complex. This will also be a rest room with running water, a much needed improvement to the park.

May 29, 2000, Memorial Day, saw the firing squad performing Memorial Day ceremonies at three local cemeteries; East Rondell, West Rondell, and the Scandanavian Church. Prior to leaving for the cemeteries, a patriotic program was presented by youth of the community, under the direction of the Legion Auxillary. Coffee & rolls were served to all Participants and observers prior to the ceremonies.

Election of Officers 3/15/2000 were as follows: Commander, Mike Hansen; Vice Commander, Duane Jark; Adjutant, Verne Prickett; Chaplin, Eugene Face; Historian, Tom Saunders; Athletic Director, Earl Shunkwiler, Sgt.@ Arms, Kenny Jark; Americanism, George Hansen Jr.; Membership, Leland Stange.

Post 207 surpassed it's membership goals set by the State. New members received into the post were; Herman Lier, Greg Milbrandt, Adam Brunes and Wendy Brunes.

The firing squad had the sad duty of performing at the funeral of Maurice Samuelson. Maurice was a long time active member of Post 207, as was his father Ed Samuelson. Maurice was a real gentleman and will be missed by all.

Post 207 will have a new, fresh appearance, It was decided by the membership that the Post would buy blue blazers for those members that had not received any from the initial purchase. Also it was decided to have grey pants and arrangements were made with a local clothing store to provide these. We will all look the same, with the members buying their own pants. In. addition, baseball type hats were purchased depicting the Post 207 logo. These to be worn to promote the Post.

Post 207 sponsored a tractor pull at the ball park on 9/24/2000. This was attended by many pullers and visitors. We ran the concession stand and made an additional \$220.00 from this activity.

In November the annual Veterans appreciation dinner was held at the Stratford Community hall in conjunction with the Legion Auxillary.

### APPENDIX B

### STRATFORD POST 207 HISTORY 1999

During the summer of 1999, POST 207 assisted in sponsoring a 5x5 softball tournament held at Stratford. Also, we assisted the Legion Auxillary by purchasing supplies for one of their youth projects in the community.

In October 1999, we sponsored a tractor pull held at the Stratford park. We set up a military tent at the site and sold lunches, assisted in prizes etc. It turned into another source of revenue for the Post and will probably become an annual affair.

Our firing squad did not have to perform for any fallen comrades in 1999.

Our goals will be to maintain a strong presence in our community, participating in those items outlined above, promoting patriotism and respect for the flag, by those of all ages in our community.





### Gun Vault



A photo of that team was among the personal effects of Earl & Mary Saunders. With the help of Ned Dixon, Gordon Gerharter and Harry E. (Bud) Ashford, all members of the team were identified.

Ned Dixon advised they were defeated 5-3 by Winner. He said they were doing well until a Winner batter hit a line drive inside the 1st base line; the hit then went out of bounds and under some cars parked along the foul line. The right fielder had trouble finding the ball under the cars, and the Winner runners were advancing, gaining the runs that beat Stratford. It was also rumored that Marvin Dunker and Kenneth Olson, after the game, were sought by the Pierre Police Department for allegedly having come into possession of some beer. They were never caught.

There are three other medals which are fairly common and which d not fall exactly within the above classifications. These are the Soldiers Medal, given for heroism but not involving an actual enemy, as for example, a heroic rescue from drowning of anyone but not in thee presence of an enemy. Navy and Marine Corps Medal, "for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy" and the Purple Heart, revived in 1932 and given retroactively to men who had received a combat wound and given in World War II to men who were combat wounded or posthumously to men killed in action or who died of wounds so received.

During the war it was obvious that the Air Corps, with its Air Medal, given basically for participation or "being there" on a flight or designated number of flights whether unusual efficiency was demonstrateed or unusual danger encountered was "putting out" medals in great numbers while the doughboys had to do something of great individual merit to be recognized. Thus the "combat infantryman's badge" was invented to give the foot soldier a like prestige for "being there". Since the end of the war this badge has been recognized as the equivalent of a "Bronze Star" but unfortunately has been listed infrequently on discharge certificates so that "of record" its existance is hard to ascertain or authenticate. All of these facts are set out as an introduction to the selected lists of men decorated that the non-military public may be better acquainted both with the medals and the methods of awarding them.

### Awarded the Silver Star

### ERDMAN, LYNN, 37 144 307, Tech. 4th Grade, Spink Co.:

"In Germany 20th November 1944, T/4 Erdman engaged in carrying survey control in a extensive system of enemy defenses \* \* \* front tapeman of this survey party stepped on a mine which blew away both feet, one of his fingers and broke both legs. \* \* \* \* Erdman disregarding warnings of the wounded man not to preceed, crawled toward him, probing his way with a small knife and reaching the wounded man carried him to safety"

Selflessness goes hand in hand with humanitarianism and any soldier who has seen a comrade killed in a mine field Erdman's action knows the determination it took to effect this rescue.

0-17 285, Brigadier General, Aberdeen

"for extraordinary heroism and distinguished service in the line of his profession while in command of a group of bombers and fighters during the raid on Japanese shipping in the Buin-Tonolei area on November 18th, 1942. In the face of severe anti-aircraft and enemy fighter opposition Colonel Saunders successfully led his planes in a daring daylight bombing raid on enemy shipping. At least two 1,000-lb. bomb hits were scored on enemy vessels and twelve enemy aircraft were destroyed. After his own aircraft was badly damaged and it became necessary to land his plane in enemy territory, he skillfully accomplished a water landing near shore, thereby permitting the remaining members of his crew to reach safety. His brilliant leadership and his will and determination to seek out and destroy the enemy were in keeping with the highest tra-dition of the service."

General Saunders who was later most seriously wounded, resulting in a crippling injury, was perhaps South

Dakota's most decorated individual. In addition to the Navy Cross given by a sister service he was cited for the Distinguished Service medal for action of July 31st, 1942; Legion of Merit for services in 1943 as a staff officer; Silver Star for gallantry in action, July 31st, 1942; Air Medal for the period March to September, 1944; Distinguished Flying Cross for exploits of October 12th and 13th, 1942, and he also was cited for the Bronze Star. General Saunders piloted the first bombardment airplane in World War II on December 7th, 1941. He was first wounded on November 18, 1942 and was in one of the first missions against Japan on June 14th, 1944, against the Imperial Iron and Steel Works at Yawata. Wounded again on September 18th, 1944, his injuries were so sever as to require hospitalization for some eighteen months.

He enjoyed snowmobiling, fishing, hunting, collecting John Deere toys and car racing. He also

enjoyed visiting with his friends and spending time with his family. He will always be remembered for his unending wit and humor.

### APPENDIX D

### EARLY HISTORY OF POST 207

### ELDERKIN P. ASHFORD STORY

Mrs. Terril Schuman Lenling had provided a 1921 photo of the membership of Post 207, taken in front of the Ashford house SW of Stratford and near Rondell Park. These men were wearing their WWI uniforms. Few men were identified, those being Ward Ashford, Bill Jark, Sigrud Annston, Ed Samuelson and Bruno Rock. An unidentified civilian was holding the US and Post Flags.

Later, Marilyn Wilke Gramley furnished a copy of the Stratford HS newspaper "The Saga," dated May 15,1952 which contained the following paragraph. "The steel liberty post which stands at the East end of Main Street was erected during the first years of World War 1. It was upon this post that Elderkin P. Ashford, a Veteran of the Civil War, hoisted the American Flag during the patriotic demonstration. The auction which was held at this time netted 18 hundred dollars of which five hundred dollars in cash was donated. All money was given to the Red Cross.

Harry E. (Bud) Ashford, while visiting this area in the Fall of 2001, identified the civilian, holding the unfurled flags in the picture of 1921 taken in front of the Ashford house as his grandfather Elderkin P. Ashford.

The Alexander Mitchell Library has indices of those buried in the various cemeteries in Brown County SD. The records show that Elderkin P. Ashford had died 8-22-1931 and was buried at Oakwood Cemetery (West Rondell). He had come to Rondell Twp. in 1892. During the Civil War he was a sergeant in Company A, 23rd Iowa Infantry. Besides being an honorary member of the American Legion Post of Stratford, he was a member of the GAR, Grand Army of the Republic, Des Moines Iowa.

Mr. Ashford had three sons who resided at Rondell residence, Fred,

Recitations and choir singing followed the grave ceremony; then the people moved to Humphrey's hall where Aberdeen's Reverend Knight spoke." "By 1898 America had veterans of the Spanish American War to honor as well as the Civil War. This added an even more serious and patriotic tone to the 1898 event." "Traditionally, three sites were involved: the hall (Humphrey), the Oak Grove Cemetery which was about a mile from the Rondell bridge, and Humphrey's grove." "From the hall a procession formed to walk and to ride toward the cemetery. Early in the day for miles along the roadways teams streamed toward Humphrey's hall to be ready for the 10:30 AM procession. Warner and Rondell school children led the procession, and behind them Aberdeen's Captain J.H. Hauser led the GAR members. Next walked the W.R.C. ladies followed by the Woodmen and others in carriages. They honored with flowers, wreaths and prayers, the Civil War and Spanish American War Veterans. The speaker of the day, Captain Hauser, had been staying at the home of E.P. Ashford, now a six year owner of the former Allen Star Farm."

Captures Colonel

At Black River Bridge his regiment lost heavily and his colonel was killed. An Iowa history of Civil war states that Mr. Ashford was first over the breastwords at this battle and while slightly alread of his contrades, he rounded a brush heap where he surprised and captured a Confederate colonel. When the officer surrendered, he gave Sergeant Ashford his sword, hich was handsomely engraved with gold and silver.

This trophy of war was carried by Ashford for several weeks, but while on the march, he gave it to 'is commanding officer, Major Houston. Since that time Mr. Ashford declared that many times he has greated the fact that he gave the sword away.

Votes for Lincoln

When old enough to voic, Mr. Achford cast his first hallot for Lincoln who was running for president. In his diary which he kept during the war, this short but somewhat dramatic entry was found "Blakely, Alabama, Thursday, April 20, 1865, The news came this evening that President Lincoln, Secretary Seward and several others were assassinated. What a blow to our government. Death to traitors is my prayer."

Mr. Ashford was mustered out of service July 25, 1865 at Harrisburg, Texas. Returning to civil life, he lived in and near Des Moines for many years engaging in farming, During this time he was married to Cassle Harriet Taylor. There were five children born to this happy union.

### Wave it proud, but wave it right..

It is important to show patriotism, but it is also important to follow the U.S. Flag Code when displaying the Stars and Stripes. Here are answers to frequently asked questions:

### Old Glory glossary

Flag Code: U.S. code that provides guidelines for flag etiquette, use and display.

Union: The white stars on the field of blue.

Flag's own right: The 'right' as the position of honor originates from the time when the right hand was the weapon hand - or a point of danger. The right hand, to an observer, is the observer's left. Therefore, as used in the Flag Code, the flag and/or flag's union is displayed to the observer's left, which is the flag's own right.

Half-staff: Position of the flag when it is at one-half the distance between the top and bottom of the staff. To place a flag at half-staff, it should first be hoisted to the peak for an instant, then lowered to its position. A flag at half-staff indicates that the nation mourns the death an individual or a group.

### Showing respect



Pledge of Allegiance: Recite the pledge while standing at attention, facing the flag, right hand over heart, headcoverings removed. Persons in uniform should remain silent and render the military salute.

National Anthem: When the anthem is played, all present should stand at attention, facing the

flag (or music if no flag is displayed), right hand over heart, with headcoverings removed. Persons in uniform should remain silent and render the military salute from the playing of the first note until the playing of the final note.

### The time is right

When to display: An all-weather flag can be flown daily, even during inclement weather. However, you are urged to display the flag on certain days each year.

### Perfect position

Staff display: When displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at an angle from a window sill, balcony or front of a building, the union of the flag should be placed at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half-staff.





Display without a staff: When displayed horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right.



the same way as viewed from the street. When suspended from a rope extending from a house to a pole, the flag should be hoisted out, union first, from the building.

In a window, the flag should be displayed

Night display: A flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness. Proper illumination includes a light placed specifically to illuminate the flag or a light source - such as a porch or street light - sufficient to make the flag recognizable





Display with other flags: When other flags are flown on the same halyard as a U.S. Flag, the latter should always be at the peak. When flown from adjacent staffs, the U.S. Flag should be hoisted first and lowered last, with no other flag above it or to the flag's own right.

Casket flags: It is acceptable for a flag used to cover a casket to be used again for any proper display purpose after a funeral. It is, in fact, considered a fitting tribute to the memory of the deceased veteran and their service to a grateful nation.

### Folding

The Flag Code does not specify how to fold the flag. The traditional method forms a triangle to symbolize the hat worn by Revolutionary War soldiers.



START: Hold flag flat between two people. The flag should never touch the ground during folding.

### STEP 1" Fold lengthwise;

bring striped half up over union.

STEP 2 Fold lengthwise; bring bottom edge up to meet top edge; union should be on top.

STEP 4 Fold triangle toward union; turn outer point in along upper edge to form a second triangle.



STEP 3

Fold lower right-hand corner to upper edge to form a triangle.

STEP 5 Continue to fold flag in triangles until the length of the flag is folded.

#### INTRODUCTION

This is the third history prepared of Stratford Legion Post 207. Effort was devoted to identify those Civil War, Spanish American War, and WWI Veterans who resided in this area and became members of Post 207 when granted its charter in 1921. We also identified those Civil War and Spanish American War Veterans buried in the three cemeteries the Post visits on Memorial Day.

Brown County was opened to Homesteading in the early 1880's. Access to an 1890 census of Civil War Veterans then residing in the County was of great assistance in preparing this document. There are still descendents of those original homesteaders residing in this County. Stratford was founded in 1906 and contributed many of its youth to the Armed Forces in WWI. Most who returned became Legion members when Post 207 was granted its charter in 1921.

Post 207 has had several families who have had multiple family members in service to their country since WW1. Father/Son: Ed & Maurice Samuelson; William & Kenneth Jark; George "Pat" Hansen Jr. & Harley Hansen; Verril & Robert Radke; Father/Daughter: Eugene Face & Korinne Face; Husband/Wife: Vern Prickett & Korinne Face; Brothers: George "Pat" Hansen Jr. & Mike Hansen; Brother/Sister: Gregg Milbrandt & Wendy Milbrandt.

The following families had three sons in the service at the same time during WW2:

Dayton: Earl, Robert & Dale; Floan: Melvin, George & Raymond; Carmine: Lee, Darrel & Owen (Owen was actually in Merchant Marine); Erdmann: Lynn, Richard, and Jack Holcomb (a half brother); Misslitz: Vernon, Donald, and Curtis.

We have had two of our Post Members called to Active Duty, viz., Harley Hansen USNR, and Greg Milbrandt SD Army Reserve Unit. Greg was called to active duty on 2/12/03. He is with a truck maintenance group and expects to see overseas duty.

# 4th of July

Post 207 has historically participated in the Stratford Community 4<sup>th</sup> of July

Celebration. Post 207 led the parade with the Colors. Those making up the detail this year:

Deanna Taylor & Earl Shunkwiler, color bearers; Verlin Stange and Greg Milbrandt, Honor Guards. Member Harley Hansen and his wife were the parade Marshall and Queen. Harley had just returned home from being called into active duty with the US Naval Reserve. Jack Gubin, Post Member, led a delegation of antique tractors who participated in the parade.

## Aberdeen Regional Airport & Terminal: Name Change

The Aberdeen Regional Airport (Saunders Field), in the spring of 2002 began construction of a new terminal building. The City of Aberdeen had originally dedicated the current terminal as a War Memorial to all Veterans, men and women, who gave their lives in the service to their country. At the same time, they named the Regional Airport, "Saunders Field", in honor of Brig. General Laverne G. Saunders. General Saunders was one of South Dakota's most decorated Veterans of WW2. Saunders was a native of the Stratford area, and a one-time member of Post 207.

Senator Tom Daschel (D) SD was able to secure 2 ½ million dollars of discretionary funds for the project. On May 10, 2002, an article appeared in the <u>Aberdeen American News</u>, wherein Tom Wylam, then Airport Mg., and Chuck Benson, Board Member, suggested a name change and that the new terminal should be dedicated to Sen. Daschel, in appreciation of his having secured the funds.

Members of Post 207, at its meeting of 8/12/02, were unanimous in their opposition to the proposed changes. It was suggested that letters to the Editor of The American News be sent, protesting the proposed changes. It was further suggested the Post Historian contact other Posts in the Regional Airport area, suggesting that they too might wish to express their opposition to the name changes. The Post Historian made direct contact with Mayor Tom Hopper of Aberdeen and Airport Board President Mike Erickson, protesting the proposed changes. Also contacted were members of the following Legion Posts: Groton, Mellette, Warner, Columbia, and Forbes, ND. Numerous letters protesting the proposed changes were published in the American News. They recommended moving the plaque from the current terminal to the new one. On 1/4/03, Senator Daschel withdrew his name and Aberdeen officials voted to keep things as they were.

Aaron Williams, Post 207 Boys' State Representative for 2002, on 9/9/02 reported to Post 207 his experiences and thanked the Post for having sponsored him.

#### Americanism

On 9/18/02, Thomas E. Saunders, Post Historian, appeared before the Groton Kiwanis Club and gave an overview of those Civil War and Spanish American War Veterans who helped settle this area, some of their accomplishments and their burial sites. Also, he discussed some of the amazing statistics of Brown County involvement in WW2. The Airport name change was also discussed, and all those who did not agree with the proposal were encouraged to make their feelings known to the proper authorities.

On 9/29/03, Post 207 sponsored an old-time tractor pull. This was held at the Stratford Park. There were participants from a wide area of NE South Dakota. # Airport terminal name approved

The War Memorial Building is now the official name of Aberdeen Regional Airport's new terminal.

The Aberdeen City Commission approved this title at its Monday meeting, ending months of controversy surrounding the naming of the new \$6.6 million facility.

The Aberdeen Airport Board first brought up dedicating the building last spring. The first name to be sugested was Aberdeen's own J.S. Sen. Tom Daschle, who secured \$2.5 million in funding for the terminal building in 2000. Daschle recently asked that his name be removed from consideration.

And last week the airport board voted unanimously to Official title War Memorial Building

#### **City Commission**

keep the same name and to physically remove the dedication plaque from the current terminal and place it in the new building.

The 15,000-square-foot terminal building will be located in a field 200 yards southeast of the current terminal and should be completed later this year.

Confusion has surrounded the issue since it was first proposed. Aberdeen Regional Airport will now consist of:

■ The new terminal building — the War Memorial Building.

■ The airfield — Saunders Field, named after local World War II hero Gen. LaVerne Saunders. This was never in danger of being renamed.

■ The current terminal — officials have said this will most likely not be renamed. It hasn't been decided what the building will be used for once the new terminal opens.

In other action, the commission:

■ Accepted the resignation of Len Scherr from the Business Improvement District Board of Directors effective immediately. Scherr's letter of resignation stated he was unable to continue his duties due to time constraints.

■ Appointed Scott Cunningham to Aberdeen's home rule task force and Jon Webb to the BID board. ■ Approved a combined notice of finding of no significant impact and a notice of intent to request funds for the Northeast Regional Health and Fitness Center and its childcare center.

■ Voted for final approval of an ordinance adopting revisions of the city's ordinances. This is required by state law and brings the city's code book up to date.

■ Set Jan. 29 bid date for a new motor grader for the public works street division, a new refuse collection unit for the solid waste division and a new three-wheel self-propelled street sweeper.

■ Received lottery notices from Shrine Hospital Auxiliary for a raffle on Dec. 5, 2003, and Homestead Tenants Organization for a raffle on March 4 and placed on file.

He will stand on a raised concrete platform surrounded by granite benches and a granite plaque on a podium describing the artwork. The area will be lighted 24 hours a day, Caven has said. Two other soldiers — one male and one female — could be added later, depending on funding. er, depending on funding. Caven said the committee

# HOMESTEADER OF STRATFORD DIES 24 March 1933 P.1. AEN

James E. Robinson, North Dakota Politician and Jurist, Passes Away

STRATFORD, March 24—James E. Robinson, picturesque and prominent North Dakota politician and jurist, died at the Soldiers' home at Milwaukee, Thursday morning, aged 95 years.

Immediately after being a mitted to the bar of the state of Michigan he enlisted in the Union army and many years after the war turned to the west.

He homesteaded three miles east of Stratford and later turned his attentions to North Dakota, where he became prominent in successfully pleading several railroad cases for the state before the supreme court of the United States. He was rewarded for his services by being sent to congress for several terms.

Mr. Robinson was an ardent non-partisan and was elected to the chief justiceship when that party dominated his state. He introduced many new practices and changes in that body and was particularly commented on in the famous North Dakota "Sleeping Beauty" case, basing his decisions more on equity than on law. Mr. Robinson also published several books on industrial conditions in North Dakota. He attempted to personally take care of his farm near Stratford but soon returned to his practice at Bismarck.

He is survived by his daughters, Mrs. Jessie Broom of Stratford, Mrs. Angle Blair of Groton and a son Arthur of old Mexico.

The remains will arrive at the fluebl undertaking parlors this afternoon and interment will be at the Stratford cemetery under the care of the local Legion post.



# Tribute given to veterans

ehind proud melodies of patriotic songs and numerous rounds of applause, the roar of airplane engines and the whir of propellers could be heard at Aberdeen Regional Airport on Tuesday.

It was music to Aberdeen City Commissioner Jacki Omland's ears.

"What an appropriate

background to open the airport with," said Omland, who sits on the Airport Board.

The mild weather drew about 350 people — public and private, military and civilian, young and old — to the grand opening of the War Memorial Building. The event included speeches by various officials, songs by the Aberdeen Regional Men's

Chorus and the unveiling of the first War Memorial statue.

The \$6.6 million terminal actually opened in August, but the grand opening was held on Veterans Day in honor of the building's name.

Tuesday's event was to pay tribute to the "tremendous work and effort" that went into the terminal

military service."

Aberdeen's airport shows the community is progressive and "geared toward the future," Hopper said.

Representatives from the offices of the state's congressional delegation read statements from Sens. Tim Johnson, Tom Daschle and Rep. Bill Janklow congratulating Aberdeen on its airport. They could not attend themselves because the Senate and House are in session.

Veterans and current military personnel unveiled the 7 1/2-foot-tall bronzed Victory Soldier. Eventually, a sculpture of a soldier in combat will stand to the right of this soldier, said sculptor Ben Victor. To the left will be a statue of a soldier showing the emotions felt in war, said Victor, a Northern State University art student. The final project cost will be about \$210,000, with that money being donated by government boards, businesses and individuals.

Victor said the Victory Soldier, holding an American flag and staring off with a "fearless" look in his eyes, is a symbol of

the strong patriotism in this country and represents past and present military men and women.

**Veterans pleased:** Tim Pond, who spent 20 years in the Marine Corps, helped unveil the statue.

"It's big," said Pond, 43, of Aberdeen, laughing. "It's pretty nice."

Pond and Harley Hansen, a member of the Naval Reserve, also liked the terminal's name and appreciated the fact that the airfield itself will still be known as Saunders Field in honor of its namesake, the late World War II hero Gen. La-Verne Saunders, a local native who flew fighters for the Air Force.

Hansen, 37, of Stratford, also helped unveil the statue.

World War II veteran Ken Thompson, 77, of Aberdeen, also thought the War Memorial Building is a fitting name for the new terminal. Although Thompson said he envisioned more of a Korean War-type dress on the Victory Soldier statue, "obviously it's a great sculpture."

Mike Erickson, an eightyear Airport Board member and past chair, said he flew in and out of Aberdeen several times in the late 1960s during his service in the Vietnam War.

Each time he thought, "You know, I might not ever see that airport again."

The day he came home for good was one of the most exciting days of his life, Erickson said. He hopes people flying into the new terminal — especially fellow veterans and military men and women — will feel the same way.

He hopes "they too will be proud to land safely at Aberdeen Regional Airport and say I am home."

# Groton Soldier In Iraq Visits Groton Elementary

Greg Milbrandt is home in Groton at the end of his two week R&R leave from duty in Iraq. He is a Platoon Sargeant with the 740th Transportation Unit out of Brookings. He has been on active duty in Iraq since April of 2003. He has only three more months to go.

Milbrandt spoke with The Groton Independent between visits to various classes of Groton Elementary last Wednesday afternoon. Milbrandt told us that he has charge of 40 troops and 23 trucks which ferry equipment and supplies from Kuwait City to staging areas in Iraq. "This is actually a safe environment, safer than being in Chicago, "says Milbrandt. This is quite different duty compared to the Aberdeen Unit which will be heading soon to Baghdad from their U.S. training site at Ft. Sill. Most of the other Groton soldiers are out of the Aberdeen unit. They will eventually be serving as security officers in and around Bahgdad which has been a hot-bed of conflict and violence in recent weeks.

Sgt. Milbrandt came out of the regular Army in 1989 and started his 'reserve' phase of service with the 142nd in Aberdeen. Because of his regular army experience he was later transferred to the Brookings unit. He has 19 years in service time counting both his regular Army and reserve Army years.

MIlbrandt told us that there are currently three truck companies in Iraq from South Dakota. His troops are responsible for keeping the Army running with parts and other supplies needed in their operations.

Milbrandt was the last in his platoon to get home leave. "That's what happens when you're the boss. You make sure your troops have all had their time at home before you take yours," he said.

Greg's wife, Julie Milbrandt, was the inspiration for getting him into the schools before heading back. She got some encouragement from their sons, Eric and Jacob, who are in the 4th and 1st grades. They eagerly joined their class-mates in listening to their father talk about life in Iraq and serving his country there. Sgt. Milbrandt's visit brought a foreign and sometimes dangerous land a world away from Groton, a little bit closer to home.

#### INTRODUCTION

Stratford S.D., a small farming community in South East Brown County, was organized in 1906, after the M & St.L Railroad, completed their line between Watertown and Aberdeen, S.D. In its early stages, Stratford boasted a population of 600, including Doctors, drugstores, hardware, lumberyards, and grain elevators. The population of the area was made up primarily of German and Scandinavian stock. Homesteading had begun for the most part in the early 1880s. The historic area of Rondell, located on the James River, is a short distance from Stratford and was the site of early Memorial Day programs at the Oakwood Cemetery, which is the site of Civil War and Spanish American War Veterans burials.

WWI Veterans from the Stratford area on 2-5-1921, petitioned to form an American Legion Post and were granted their Charter on 3-1-1921, as American Legion Post 207.

The first History prepared of Post 207, written in 2000, included a review of the Adjutant's Records for the period 1946 through 2000. An exhaustive search of Legion Records and storage areas failed to locate Post records for the period 1921 through 1945.

Many thanks are extended to State Adjutant Ron Boyd and his staff at

Watertown Headquarters, who took the time and effort to review old records and
provided this Post with membership lists of the Post for years 1921 through 1945.

That data is reported in this History and made it possible to prepare plaques, now displayed in the Community Center at Stratford, identifying those Stratford area residents and Post Members who were members of the armed forces from WWl through the present conflicts.

Stratford has a proud history of service in the armed forces. Some have paid the supreme sacrifice, and others have been highly decorated.

As in the past, thanks are extended to Kathy Williams and Kelly Face for their assistance in the publishing of this history.


Additional thanks are extended to Dacotah Bank, Aberdeen for their generous offer of using their copying machine.

A new Regional Terminal was built and dedicated on 11-11-03. There was a proposal by an Airport Board member to rename the field "Daschel Field" as a way of thanking Senator Tom Daschel. Senator Daschel is also a native of the Aberdeen area. There were letters of protest to the suggested name change by Veterans groups in the area. Senator Daschel then asked that his name be withdrawn, and to his everlasting credit the proposed name change was not anything he had requested or wanted. Authorities then announced the airport would continue to be known as "Saunders Field." However, they failed to move the General's portrait from the old terminal to the lobby of the new terminal.

Carlon Von Wagner, a retired accountant residing in Aberdeen, wrote a letter to the Editor of the Aberdeen American News, protesting the fact the photograph was not on display in the new Terminal and requesting an appearance before the Airport Board. Subsequent to the letter to the Editor, the portrait was mounted on a wall in the secured area of the terminal and could be viewed by those persons flying out of Aberdeen after they had passed security checks. The general public could not view the portrait from the lobby.

Mr. Von Wagner then asked the following group of men to accompany him to a meeting of the Airport Board; Don Whittlinger, Commander VFW Aberdeen, Al Sebert Commander of Post 24, Aberdeen, Joe Kelly Capt. 147th Field Artillery WW2, and Thomas E. Saunders, Commander Post 207, Stratford. This group met with the Airport Board on two occasions, 8-5-04 and 9-5-04. On the first visit, Board Members directed Staff members to move the General's portrait to a spot in the lobby where all could see it, and ultimately it was the hope the portrait would be moved to the West wall of the lobby and share that space with the plaque dedicating this building as a war memorial for all Veterans who had given their lives in the service of their country. At the last meeting, the Board informed the group they were preparing signage that would state "Welcome to Saunders Field" as visitors entered the terminal area and another that said "Thanks for visiting Saunders Field," on the exit road.

In addition to the above, Ben Victor, the sculptor, informed he intended to make a bronze profile of General Saunders and present it to the Airport Board, at no cost, to be mounted at an appropriate location in the main lobby.

#### Fall Tractor Pull 9-26-04

Stratford American Legion Post 207, has, over the past few years, sponsored a Fall tractor pull held at the Stratford Park. Ronald "Jack" Gubin has served as coordinator for this event.

This year's pull was reported as the largest ever with 120 pulls. There were in excess of 60 tractors registered for the event.

Tractor pulls have developed into a family affair with some father-son combinations competing.

Post 207 again operated a concession stand and provided a flag-man and hook-up man.

#### Application for Post of The American Legion

Provisions of Constitution Adopted at Minneapolis Convention November 10, 11, 12, 1919

BLIGIBILITY.



Section 1. Any person shall be eligible for membership in The American Legion who was regularly enlisted, drafted, inducted or commissioned, and who served on active duty in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps of the United States at some time during the period between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, both dates inclusive, or who, beling a citizen of the United States, at the time of his entry therein, served on active duty in the Naval, Military or Air forces of any of the Governments associated with the United States during the Great War; provided, that no person shall be entitled to membership (a) who, being in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps of the United States during said period, refused on conscientions, political, or other grounds, to subject himself to military discipline or unqualified service, or (b) who, being in such service, was separated therefrom under circumstances amounting to dishonorable discharge and has not subsequently been officially restored to an bonorable status.

Section 2. There shall be no form or class of membership except an active membership as hereinabove provided.

ARTICLE IX.

ARTICLE IX. Section 1. Those who desire to form a Post shall make application for a charter to the Commander of the Department in which they reside. The charter shall be issued by the National Commander and National Adjutant upon receipt of the application properly executed by the charter members of the projected post, but only when such application is approved by the Commander of the Department or by the Department Executive Committee. Post charters shall be countersigned by the Commander and the Adjutant of the Department.

Section 2. The minimum membership of a post shall be determined by the Executive Committee of the Department in whose area it lies.

Section 8. Bach Department may prescribe the Constitution of its posts. Post charters may be revoked by the Department Executive Committee.

Section 4. No post shall be named after any living person.

INSTRUCTIONS (Read carefully)—Each local group will designate a representa-tive to sign the certificate at the foot of this application and to receive the charter when issued. No application can be considered unless properly executed by at least fifteen men. Applications must be made in triplicate, one original bearing the signatures of fifteen applicants eligible for membership and two copies bearing the same fifteen names type-written. All three will be forwarded to the Department Commander. The original application will be returned by indorsement to the Local Post with the charter. One copy of application will be retained by Department Headquarters, and the other by National fleadquarters. Commonder.







New sculpture at Aberdeen airport among highlights

t the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month when in 1918 the "War to End All Wars" ended - more than 1,000 gathered Thursday to honor those who have served in the nation's armed forces.

A morning program at Aberdeen Central High School in the new Golden Eagles Arena included a musical and spoken tribute to area veterans.

Servicemen and women from all branches of the service and every war since World War II were present for the salute, which at times took on a celebratory atmosphere with music and applause.

Emcee Army Sgt. 1st Class Dennis Nelson, a retired Gulf War veteran, called the crowd to attention as the color guard carried the American flag into the arena and the Aberdeen blic Schools Elementary us sang "The Star Span-

Pastor Rick Riedel of

Plymouth Congregational Church delivered the invocation, and the children again sang, this time "Stars and Stripes Forever" and "God Bless America.'

With students waving flags, members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion proudly wearing their service caps and a few current service members in full battle dress uniform, Nelson recognized Aberdeen's two former prisoners of war.

Nelson called the names of World War II Army Air Corps officers retired Lt. Col. Sydney Mortenson, who was unable to attend, and former 1st Lt. Richard Grandpre, who sat in a wheelchair in the front row.

Both were shot out of the skies over Europe. Grandpre, POW in German camps, saluted as the audience applauded his service and

Nelson also read the names of a number of area service-men who were killed in Vietnam, and recognized those parents who were present. The Central High Sym-

phonic Band followed the recognition with its own musical salute to the various branches of the service.

A student called out the names of the services starting with the Army and ending with the Navy, playing each branch's song while those veterans stood to be recognized.

Former State American Legion Commander Wayne "Red" Vetter of Cresbard gave the address of the day.

"There are certain things that we take for granted at times," Vetter began his address. "Our freedom, our safety, a good job, and you can

add to that our military." Vetter, a World War II veteran, reminded the crowd of the sacrifices made by those who have served, and of what those people fought for.
"This is your day," he said

to the veterans. "You who fought to preserve our right to life, liberty and pursuit of happiness."

As he wound up his remarks, Vetter reminded the crowd of the 25 million veterans in the United States, and that half of those are younger

"World War I was not the War to End All Wars — every generation has had its war from Pearl Harbor to Baghdad," he said.

New sculpture: Later in the day, about 50 people gathered at the Aberdeen Regional Airport for the dedication of the second of three statues for the airport's war memorial.

The new statue — sculpted by Northern State University resident sculptor Ben Victor — shows a soldier kneeling and pointing with his left hand; an M-16 assault rifle is in his right hand.

At the dedication, Victor called it the Combat Soldier. The first statue, the Victory Soldier, was unveiled last Veterans Day and stands, holding an American flag, to the right of the new figure.

"It is my honor to be here today to dedicate this sculpture to the veterans," Victor said before a detail of about a dozen veterans cut the rope and removed the tarp covering the new bronze sculpture.

Gasps and oohs could be heard over the biting prairie wind as the tarp came off and the crowd of Victor's family members, veterans and others began to applaud.

Victor said he hopes to have the third and final war sculpture — the Aftermath Soldier — completed and ready for dedication on Veterans Day 2005.

"I hope it speaks to everyone here," Victor said.

After the program, people milled around the memorial.

"You can almost see what he's thinking," said one woman in the crowd as she looked at the Combat Soldier.

Mike Erickson, a Vietnam veteran from Aberdeen, said he was thrilled with the outcome of the sculpture.

come of the sculpture.

"It turned out better than when I saw it in clay — it's just a fantastic work," Erickson said.

A number of veterans were invited by Victor to see the clay sculpture earlier this year before he sent it to be cast in bronze.



## INTRODUCTION

This being the Centennial Year for the town of Stratford, it is appropriate that we also recall the circumstances of the founding of the American Legion.

Officers of the American Expeditionary Forces in France in World War I, under the guidance of Lt. Col. Theodore Roosevelt, proposed an organization of Veterans. The first organizational meeting took place in France in March of 1919. It considered every Veteran of the AEF to be a member of the Legion. Congress then granted the Legion its Charter in September of 1919. Stratford Post 207 was granted a Charter in 1921, and those who obtained that charter have been identified in previous histories. The goals of the American Legion are set forth hereafter in the Preamble to the Constitution, and are summed up in the phrase, "For God and Country."

The town of Stratford, founded in 1906, quickly grew, as did the membership made up of WWI Veterans. With the advent of WWI, there were many large families, living within a seven mile radius of Stratford who responded to the needs of their country, and upon their return were part of the original membership.

Members of this community have historically exhibited great patriotism and support for the Armed Forces. WW2 saw 7 families within this small area with three sons in the service at the same time.


Recently, the entire community supported the Post in their successful effort to erect a Veterans' Memorial, honoring all Veterans of all wars since WWI. This monument will be placed at the entrance of the Stratford City Park.

To this end, an ad hoc committee was formed, made up of Pat Hansen, Alan Hoeft, Bill and Diane Klager, and Bonnie Reiss, President of the Post Auxiliary. Val Jark, of Jark Auction Service, volunteered the use of his services for an auction. Ron Glugla, a native of Stratford, volunteered the use of one of his storage facilities to store items donated for the auction. Alan and Bill went forth gathering items for the auction from businesses and private individuals in the Stratford, Groton, Aberdeen, Bath, and Warner areas.

The Auction was held at the Stratford Community Hall on 4-2-06, resulting in sales in excess of \$10,000. This will allow the Post to order the Monument that was agreed upon at a regular meeting of April 10, 2006. The wording has been approved by the entire membership. The monument will be erected on city property, just west of the entrance to the Stratford City Park. This

site will provide access to electrical power, so a Flag Pole will be erected where the Flag can fly on a 24 hour basis.

All those who donated to our auction were thanked by a letter to the editor of the Aberdeen American News, while individuals making donations received subsequent to the auction have been thanked by individual correspondence.

at state competition.



#### THIS WEEK

Dr. Jerry Rosonke spoke about the history and culture of the Pledge of Allegiance. It is recited at multitudinous events of every kind and nature, but not a lot is known about its history.

In 1892 the United States had recovered from the worst effects of the Civil War and the country was experiencing an influx of immigrants from around the world. In 1891 about half a million had entered through New York. The country was also preparing for the 400th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of America.

The pledge was published in the September 1892 issue of a popular magazine, The Youth's Companion. Daniel Ford was the owner of the magazine, and Francis Bellamy, a Christian Socialist minister, worked for the same publishing company. Today, Bellamy is generally thought to be the author. Pamphlets were sent to schools across the nation containing his work. At that time it read: "I pledge allegiance to my flag and to


the republic for which it stands, one nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

On Flag Day, June 14, 1923, the words "my flag" were modified to "the flag of the United States" and a year later the phrase "of America" was added. In 1942 Congress made the pledge part of the Flag Code. This was the first official sanction of the pledge. In 1945 Congress gave the pledge its official title, "The Pledge of Allegiance." It was previously known simply as the pledge to the flag. The last change occurred on June 14, 1954 when Congress officially added the phrase "under God," which has spawned litigation, and also legislation in Congress to the limit authority of federal courts to hear such cases, as permitted by Article III, Section 2, Clause 3 of the Constitution.



#### A BRIEF HISTORY:

On August 19, 1943 concerned citizens in the Aberdeen community opened the Red Cross/USO Canteen in the depot of the Chicago-Milwaukee RR to provide free funches and assistance to hundreds of troops traveling through Aberdeen on special trains. This unique service continued for 2 ½ years until March 22, 1946 when the last troops were served.

During those 30 months more than 586,000 servicemen and women were served delicious home-made lunches. An average of 500 troops arrived on 4-6 trains each day. Sometimes as many as 1,500 troops came on a single day and into the night.

The menu began with ground ham sandwiches, cake, cookies, donuts, fresh fruit, pie, milk and coffee. A birthday cake was always ready for anyone celebrating a birthday. In December of 1943 some farmers began bringing pheasants to the canteen workers and the pheasant sandwich became a significant part of the menu. When the troops passed the word along to friends and family about Aberdeen they referred to the "Pheasant Canteen." At one time nearly 1,000 birds were in storage for the canteen workers.

The generosity of the people was almost unbelievable. Most of the food was donated. Various groups organized fund raisers to support the canteen. Volunteers who prepared and served the food came from nearly 40 communities. Pheasant hunts were organized and the Chicago-Milwaukee RR transported many donations to Aberdeen. The cost to operate the canteen averaged \$560 per month for additional supplies which were not donated.

During the holidays there was a lighted Christmas tree and on December 24, 25 and 26 troops received a Christmas gift. At Easter colored eggs were prepared.

General Dwight D. Eisenhower and presidential candidate Harry S. Truman were served at the canteen.

The canteen was officially closed and the space was vacated on March 31, 1946. Funds remaining in the canteen account were deposited in the Brown County Red Cross Disaster Fund and remain there today.

### Residents share a 'what's next?' feeling



Stratford, located in East Rondell Township, was a late-comer in Brown County, platted in October 1906. The town was founded on the last rail line to be built, the Minneapolis & St. Louis Railway.

It was almost two years later that the first train came

Settlers had been in the area for years, using Rondell as a trade center. The name Roudell was transferred to Stratford at first, but railroad officials feared there would be confusion since Rondell sounded so much like Randolf, which was a town further southeast. To end the confusion, the railroad chose the name Stratford.

Stratford quickly grew and prospered. The town reached its peak with a population of 600 in about five years. It boasted two banks, a meat market, the Pioneer Hotel. four elevators, two churches, dray & transfer companies, a newspaper, two hardware dealers, three doctors, three restaurants, three saloons, a pool room, two blacksmith shops, a barber and bath, a

confectionery, a drugstore, an implement dealership, a flour and feedmill, a furniture store. three lumberyards, a loan office, a millner's shop, a real estate office and a shoe store.

Citizens brought trees from the banks of the James River to give shade and beauty to the town's streets.



Also, it was planned to unearth the time capsule that had been buried 25 years ago at a location near the NW corner of the Community tennis court.

After the Memorial Day practice, Post members and many from the community retired to the capsule burial site and with shovels in hand began the process of recovery of the time capsule. Over the last 25 years, a nearby tree had grown considerable with its roots entwined about the capsule. After much effort, Alan Hoeft, with his tractor and bucket, was able to extract the capsules (two ammunition boxes) from the ground. The capsules were covered with a heavy layer of tar and were a complete external mess. # Day of Champions? brings out athletes

Members of Northern football team do work in Aberdeen, Stratford, Ipswich

On April 29, 50 Northern football players, closely monitored by their coaches, hauled dirt, painted, dug holes, tore up fence, mowed, raked and scraped paint. One might wonder whether this is a strange new training method.

In fact, this is the fourth time the Northern team has volunteered an entire day to perform community work this year in Aberdeen, Ipswich and Stratford.

"They were willing to do anything and we worked them hard," said Tiger Post board member Renae Gauer. Tiger Post is a community center for kids in Ipswich. Eight players planted trees, moved planters, scooped sand and applied weather-proofing.

In Stratford, 14 players and two coaches helped renovate the new community center. They painted, hauled gravel and cleared dead trees out of the picnic area.

"They did good work," said city council member Allen Hoeft. He explained that the players worked on four other buildings in town, getting them in ship-shape condition for the Stratford centennial celebration this summer.

The Northern players and

coaches were in Stratford from 9 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. Tom Saunders, commander of Stratford's Legion Post, said the players painted anything that didn't move. 10:102

"They did literally thousands of dollars work if we had to pay to have it done and they got it done in one day. They did a hell of a job," said Saunders, who lives in Aberdeen. A said Saunders, who lives in Aberdeen a group of 15 players worked at the Boys & Girls Club and at The Learning Tree Daycare. At the day care they removed and scrubbed the playground equipment, replaced the matting and wood chips, showeled sand and built a retaining wall. At the Boys & Girls Club they painted did yard work and picked up trash.

The "Day of Champions"



# Railroad chooses name of Stratford


### Residents share a 'what's next?' feeling

Stratford, located in East Rondell Township, was a late-comer in Brown County, platted in October 1906. The town was founded on the last rail line to be built, the Minneapolis & St. Louis Railway.

It was almost two years later that the first train came

Settlers had been in the area for years, using Rondell as a trade center. The name Rondell was transferred to Stratford at first, but railroad officials feared there would be confusion since Rondell sounded so much like Randolf, which was a town further southeast. To end the confusion, the railroad chose the name:Stratford.

Stratford quickly grew and prospered. The town reached its peak with a population of 600 in about five years. It boasted two banks, a meat marker, the Pioneer Hotel, four elevators, two churches, dray & transfer companies, a newspaper, two hardware dealers, three doctors, three restaurants, three saloons, pool room, two blacksmith shops, a barber and bath, a

confectionery, a drugstore, an implement dealership, a flour and feedmill, a furniture store, three lumberyards, a loan office, a millner's shop, a real estate office and a shoe store.

Citizens brought trees from the banks of the James River to give shade and beauty to the town's streets.

On June 18, 1919, Stratford was incorporated.

Small towns in northeast. South Dakota usually have many things in common. Close-knit church and family affiliations and civic loyalty are among the assets that bring strength and unity to little communities, even when the

population of the community in question plummets to lewer than 90 people. Stratford has never lost any of the adhesive bonds that make it unique

among small towns.
The high school was closed in 1956 and the students were sent to Warner. In 1977, the railroad line was abandoned.

# Remember families of fallen heroes on Memorial Day

WASHINGTON — Memorial Day is hard upon us, and hard on us as well.

While most Americans celebrate the holiday as the first long weekend of summer, the rest of us will be honoring the sacrifice of countless American lives during 230 years of our nation's history. Winning our independence was bloody work; defending our freedom has been even bloodier.

We are a nation at war this year, just as we have been for the last five years since the terror attacks on innocent American citizens on Sept. 11, 2001. We are at war, but

ho among us knows the rue cost of war, and who pays the price?

The answer to that question is, of course, our living veterans of wars.

All but 50 of the 5 million veterans of World War I are gone from among us. Only about 3.5 million of 16 million American veterans of World War II are still alive. Some 3.2 million veterans of the Korean War are still alive. About 2.5 million of the

3.4 million who served in the Vietnam War theater are still living.

They surely know the true cost of war.

The knowledge of that cost is borne even more keenly by the widows and children, fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters of those who gave their lives in battle in our country's wars.

There are so many of them, and more coming with each passing day in the wars we are fighting now.

The children of war, especially, have so large a claim on our hearts. They have lost fathers, and now even their mothers, in today's wars. The estimate is that Iraq alone has left 3,000 children without one parent or with no parent at all.

This Memorial Day I will be thinking particularly of the five children of the two Army pilots of a Kiowa Warrior helicopter shot down in Mosul, Iraq, on Jan. 13. Their fathers, CWO3 Mitchell K. Carver Jr., 31, of Charlotte, N.C., and CWO2 Kyle E. Jackson, 28, of Sarasota, Fla., were flying cover for a small three-vehicle patrol of Stryker armored vehicles at the time.

I was riding in one of those Strykers at the time and was at the crash site within minutes.

At that moment I knew that within a matter of a few hours Army sedans with a chaplain and a casualty notification officer would be pulling up outside houses bearing the news that would shatter happy lives. I knew that those young children would carry holes in their hearts all their lives — holes where a father was supposed to dwell.


My friend Karen Spears Zacharias lost her father, Sgt. David Spears, in Vietnam in 1966 when she was 9. She's written a book about what that one death among 58,250 in that war did to the lives of her mother, her two siblings and herself. It's out in paperback with a new title: "After the Flag Has Been Folded."

She travels around the country talking to new widows and their heartbroken children. She tries to help them understand that they are not alone.

So this Memorial Day, think of all our fallen servicemen in America's wars. But think especially of those innocents they left behind—so filled with pride, so filled with grief, so filled with pain. They are there in many American cities and towns.

Reach out to them. Tell them you thank them for their family's great sacrifice. Tell them we grieve with them. Offer them any help they need. Tell them they are not alone.



# Area veterans promote protection of Old Glory

ietnam veteran Allan Ochsner of Aberdeen doesn't believe an amendment is necessary to protect the U.S. flag from desecration.

"Being an American citizen that fought for this country, I feel that we don't need the amendment because if somebody does that in front of me, I will take care of it to the best of my abilities," he said.

A bill proposing a constitutional amendment prohibiting the physical desecration of the U.S. flag is expected to come before the U.S. Senate in the next week or so. Sens. John Thune, R-S.D., and Tim Johnson, D-S.D., were both original co-sponsors of the bill.

On June 22, 2005, the U.S. House of Representatives passed such a bill that reads "The Congress shall have power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States." Rep. Stephanie Herseth, D-S.D., was an original co-sponsor of the bill.

# Stars, stripes displayed today, Flag Day

Ochsner, commander of the Disabled American Veterans in Aberdeen, doesn't think the proposed amendment would infringe on First Amendment rights, as some have argued.

Other Aberdeen-area veterans agreed with Ochsner. Tom Saunders of Aberdeen, commander of the Stratford American Legion and a World War II veteran, hopes the legislation passes.

"It's long overdue," he said "It's a real simple, straightforward amendment."

Don Whittlinger of Aberdeen, past Veterans of Foreign Wars commander, and current VFW Commander Al Waltman of Aberdeen believe the flag should be respected but aren't sure whether a constitutional amendment is necessary.

"Maybe we shouldn't have to go through legislation to get that kind of protection on the flag, but I think it's a very important issue," Waltman said. Whittlinger is concerned that the legislation is too broad and could affect the burning ceremony that retires old flags.

"There should be a solution (included in the legislation) to getting rid of those flags that no longer should be used," he said.

Al Sebert of Aberdeen, Aberdeen American Legion commander, compares flagburning as a statement to burning down someone's home — he believes people don't have that right.

"I think we have to have (the legislation) because I don't think that what we've got is working," he said. "(The flag) is a symbol of our county, our liberty, everything that we fight for. We went to wars to protect that flag."

The amendment is especially at the forefront today, Flag Day.

Flags displayed today: The Exchange Club of Aberdeen displays flags around town between 14 and 16 times per year, including Flag Day, said Club President Stan Jung of Aberdeen.

"We stand to promote Americanism and remember those who have died (for our country)," Jung said.

Flags are flown on all major holidays and special occasions, such as the Oz Festival, Brown County Fair and various organizations' district or state meetings.

"It's probably the only flag that flies in the world today that allows all the great things that we enjoy in this country," Waltman said. "I think we're pretty fortunate that we live here."

During each special event, 450 flags are displayed, many on Main Street. They are put up on seven routes beginning about 5:30 a.m. and taken down about 5:30 p.m.







If you're planning to enter your pet in the "Fluffiest Dog or Cat" category, feel free to tease and hair spray as much as your critter will tolerate.







Origins of Veterans Day Dear Annie: I would like to clarify the origins of Veterans Day. Company B of the 137th Infantry of the Kansas National Guard was called into active duty on Jan. 6, 1941. One of those soldiers was Private First Class John (Bull) Cooper-Pfc. Cooperwas killed in action on Dec. 20, 1944, in Germany. He received the Silver Star for his gallantry under fire.

Cooper's uncle was Emporia, Kan., shoe repairman Al King. King and his wife, Gertrude, helped raise John Cooper, and were devastated by the loss. King started looking for a way to honor his nephew. His idea was to change Armistice Day, a holiday set aside to honor the end of WWI, into an all-inclusive national holiday honoring all servicemen and women of all conflicts past, present and future.

King gained the support of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, AmVets and American War Dads. He found another ally in U.S. Rep. Ed Rees, also from Emporia. Rees wrote the act effecting the change, and both houses of Congress passed it. President Eisenhower, another Kansan, signed the bill into law on June 1, 1954.

The first nationwide cele-

bration of this new holiday was held on Nov. 11, 1954. Emporia, of course, held the very first "All Veterans Day" on Nov. 11, 1953.—Greg Jordan, Executive Director, Lyon County Historical Society


